"Mindfulness"

Crime, war, mental illness, substance abuse, divorce, sexual abuse, neglect, death and other mayhem slips into our lives, forever changing the fabric of our family and sometimes our very being. There is no escaping the gutwrenching emotions when life has not gone "as planned" and you have no control; no way of making it all better. I have been a parent for 31 years and my family has experienced, thankfully, only a few of life's tragedies. I've tried to be the "straight up" parent. The one who says what is wrong and works with my sons to make it right. The one who makes mistakes AND apologizes. The one who lets their own inner child shine through. The one who does the hard work first and plays later. The one who knows discipline and love go hand in hand. The one who is mindful of what is going on with that specific child and is present in the moment. The one who went to and made sure the family was involved in church and school events and boy scouts and music lessons and all the other activities that help children grow into responsible members of the community. I've succeeded and I've failed at any and all of these intentions, daily.

I've learned that rarely does a situation require an immediate reaction, but sometimes that's all I've got in me at the time. I've learned that day to day "what are we going to do about..." parenting is laborious and tiring. . . There are days we simply don't have the energy to stop and think about the given situation and how our child is reacting. I've learned good intentions and excellent parenting skills aren't always enough and professional help is necessary. I've learned that punishment isn't nearly as effective as we wished or thought it would be and frequently makes a wearier parent than the child. I've learned there is wisdom in the hive and it really does take a village to raise a child. Parenting takes a life time.

I wish I was a more mindful parent in the early years. I know I have become more present with my feelings and my sons' feelings as we grew older. Apologies have been offered and accepted. I am grateful for that. Despite all we've been through, I believe my best parenting was and is the gift of myself; my whole real self with all my cracks and faults. The one who loves and shares unconditionally. That is enough.

Part of mindfulness is learning to calm ourselves. I am incorporating mindfulness practice into our Sunday morning chapel. Perhaps you will consider incorporating meditation into your family life at home.

Garden and Grounds



It is a very early spring on the hill this year. Daffodil, forsythia and pear blooming time is past and it is now crabapple, redbud and dogwood time. Other trees are budding and blooming and I think the pale green willow leaves and first tiny reddish, scallop-edged oak leaves are as pretty as any of the flowers. The trails are in good shape and there is a good amount of water in the pond. I haven't seen our turtles yet, (though they are out at Swan Lake which gets warmer earlier than our deep woodsy spot). Lots of robins are still around though not the dozens flocking a few weeks ago: they are now into pairing up and nesting.

February was the most above-normal temperature month worldwide in meteorological records kept since 1880. Places everywhere are not getting as cold

as they used to. So heads-up gardeners – we are living in changing, challenging times, more heat /drought stresses to plants and more insects that are not being killed out by cold winters. Look for "bug boxes" (containing repellant spray and wipes) one on the back church patio and one on the deck behind the cabin. Feel free to use before hiking the trails or walking in the woods.

Spring clean-up day was Saturday March 19 and cheers and hoorays and accolades for everyone (all 16 or so) who showed up and worked at many tasks. The kids' playground was raked and the leaves mulched, flower beds tidied up, raingardens cleaned out, grasses cut back and more followed by a pizza lunch. Thanks to all of you. And special thanks to Fred Pottorf who brought his wonderful lawn-sweeping and mulching equipment. The north parking lots are in better shape than they have been for some years. (Now if we can just get the parking stripes repainted - hopefully before the Installation on April 17 and the many new guests to our hill.)

Milkweed plants have been ordered and will be here sometime this month. Early data indicates the nationwide plantings have helped the Monarchs. We will continue to do our part and hope the trend continues. If anyone wants to rototill the butterfly bed on the south side of the roads it would be a good thing. Or cultivate the children's garden area to prepare for planting.

Future events: Earth Day Sunday, April 24. Special Earth Day service followed by family picnic. (Actual Earth Day is the 22^{nd.)}

Future dream: An outdoor chapel area. Stay tuned.
