From the Minister



We play a crazy card game in our family call Fluxx. It's wild because the rules change with each turn. You think you're ahead then, "Oops, now I am dead last." In five minutes you're on top of the game again. The game drives anyone is who is competitive crazy. A player has to learn to let go to enjoy the play.

Last week the Rev. John Dorhauer, the keynote speaker at our Association's Ministry Days in Columbus OH, encour-


aged churches to play more. He was very specific in his definition of play. He encourages our congregations to be more like Fluxx.

Some games and systems are finite, with clear boundaries, rules, winners and los-

ers. Dorhauer claims many churches in America, not just Unitarian Universalist, are playing a finite game. His example is a church that counts members and dollars as the primary measures of its worth or success. Often the theology can be finite and fixed. Welcoming can be finite, with clear insiders and outsiders.

In an infinite game, the only reason to play is to keep the game going. You play for yourself and for all who come along later. This type of game is without boundaries. A church playing an infinite game is constantly thinking outside the box and reinventing itself.

What does not change in this more dynamic



church is its mission. The core church values remain while adapting to cultural changes. Change is not for the sake of change. Mission remains at its center. Dorhauer uses words like joy and play to describe these churches.

In essence he's asking Theodore Parker's 1841 question of what is permanent and what is transient in our church project? When we hold dearly to what is permanent and loosen our grip to the rest, we can play and enjoy our community all the more. We can be more effective and life changing.

July's Theme: Journey

Do you love or hate to travel? Does the idea of flying, driving, riding, or floating delight you or frighten you? Is your daily routine a source of refuge or do you like disruptions? I am asking about one kind of journey---a physical trip or journey. Our reactions to taking trips (not all trips are equal or vacations) are clues to receptivity of change and new ideas. In turn, these preferences point to our willingness to enjoy or fully experience other types of metaphorical or symbolic journeys.

The metaphor of religious seeking as a journey is ancient. A pilgrimage to a holy or special place is an exercise in meeting yourself coming and going, discovering your true nature.

This month we will look at journeys--real and imagined, mythical or banal---for all they have to teach us and change us.

These young ladies are two of the many reasons I love serving Hope. United with caring parents, grandparents and other adults we are creating a faith journey few children and youth are allowed to experience. To me, these children represent the story of my own family and loving church community.

My two sons were raised in a UU church, from the ages of 6 and infancy. At the time, I did not realize how important this loving community would be in our lives. I certainly didn't recognize we were on a journey together. With these people, my sons learned to respect themselves and others, to live in community, to question and find their own answers. I learned how to be part of something bigger than myself and how to give and receive the love this community so freely shares. We loved and were loved by those trusted adults and youth through the struggles of the teen years, into adulthood and the death of my older son, Sean. Those trusted adults and my sons' friends grieved with us, loved us and held my family during the darkest time we have known. Those holy people hold a sacred place in our hearts and I am deeply grateful for their presence in our lives.

I tell you this story because we, too, are on a journey together, though most of us do not realize it. You hold me as I have joined this community and I hold you. No one knows where it will take us.

No one knows what our community will face in the years to come. We cannot anticipate the joy and sorrow we will share. The journey may not be easy and certainly will hold some heartache, but more importantly, it will be filled with love.

It is a privilege to be together on this journey of parenting and loving children. There are so many things to do and be, questions to answer and questions to leave for our young ones to answer. I hope you will walk with us, whether you are young or old or in-between. This journey is for the entire village.

Garden and Grounds

Summertime has officially arrived though it has felt like it for some weeks already. For a brief moment it is day lily time on the hill. Like the iris, they survive with little care and can show up in unlikely places. The weather experts predict it to be a hot dry summer for our part of the country and watering has started. Many thanks, as always, to our watering crew.

Lantana, cone flowers, day lilies, penstemmon, zinnias and daisies are the main color in the front entrance beds. A variety of native plants bloom in the rain garden, perennial garden and elsewhere. Most of the milkweed plants are in the big butterfly bed by the road, but some are in with the black foot daisies north of the road, in front of the cabin and across the front drive to give mama monarchs a choice of nursery options. Our Monarch Waystation certificate (#13542) is on the bulletin board. Monarch-Watch.org has lots of information on the species and the efforts being made to save it.

The Vitex (Chaste tree) down from the back patio is lovely right now and hosts many bees. The kids' garden has been planted with cherry tomatoes, parsley, rosemary and dill (as a black swallowtail host), and a sunflower garden has been seeded along the inner playground fence.


