From the Minister



A critical mass of Hope members and staff attended The Point last week, our Unitarian Universalist week-long camp for all ages. The pace was both busy and relaxed. We rushed to the next activity but also had time for impromptu conversations.

Our children got to know other UU children from around the country. The adults met regional staff, religious educators, ministers and lay members. We even had the chance for conversations with one of the candidates for UUA president (Yes, *other* elections are coming up too.) We all came together for meals, wor-

ship, swimming, singing, dancing, playing games, walking, and spontaneous silliness.

One lasting piece of wisdom I heard this week came from our key note speaker, George Kimmich Beach, a minister and theologian, a renaissance man really. He defined the word **sacred** as "**that which you cannot violate without violating yourself.**" The phrase captures my imagination. It echoes the Golden Rule, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

In both, the first point of reference is one's self. It repeats what the Transcendentalists, Buddhists, and airline employees say, begin with yourself. Put your oxygen mask on first.

When I consider how I want to be treated; when I notice how it feels to be left out, labeled or mislabeled; when I begin to treat others the way I wish to be treated, I have taken significant steps toward being kind and fair. The Golden Rule isn't perfect. The refining Platinum Rule, "Do unto others as they would like done unto them" takes the empathy a step further demanding knowledge of what another person wants and needs. This additional hurdle involves sympathy and communication. If you don't ask what the other person wants then you may be far off the mark of how he or she (or ze) wish to be treated.

Beach's definition of sacred insists first we must know ourselves and what we value. It does not evoke the need for any supernatural blessing. Instead it is grounded in our reality and self-understanding. Truly, there is nowhere else to begin but with our own perceptions and lived experiences.

For example, I consider family vital. Ignoring or damaging those relationships violates myself. I consider sacred all connections with friends, coworkers and Hope members as well as strangers I come across. With this definition of sacred I have begun a list of what I consider sacred. Education. Beauty. Health. Equality. Fairness. Childhood innocence and safety. Love. The list grows. What is sacred to you? What must you not violate? Let's compare lists.

What's the big deal about Religious Education?

There is a spiritual practice where in the participants listen or read the same passage. The passage can be as simple as, "Parents are the primary religious educator of a child". Let's ponder that sentence again and let it sink in. Parents are the primary religious educator of a child. One more time. Parents are the primary religious educator of a child. Now sit with it. How does that settle in your bones? How does that feel in your soul? You may find yourself thinking: Then, why am I taking my family to church? What does the religious education program at church provide that I cannot? What are the people in religious education teaching? I don't know anything about religion; how can I possibly do this?

While parents are a child's primary teacher in LIFE, parents are rarely prepared or may not even perceive the importance of the role of religious educator in their children's lives. Many parents seek a religious community to invite this dynamic into their family's life. The church community is a place to help us formulate our own religious and spiritual lives, to comfort us in times of trouble and to raise our children in a loving environment. The church provides supplemental information and direction when our parenting resources don't quite answer life's burning questions. We need someone to guide us through the big questions, to examine our own weaknesses, and generously share our treasure and talent. Religious education provides all this and more. Parents have told me, "I don't want to tell them what to believe" or "We believe...". Some parents are absolutely certain what they want their children to believe, making it difficult to allow the child to walk their own path. This is why we take our children to church and where formal religious education adds a richness to the fabric of our children's religious and spiritual walk.

The teachers, the committee and I are here to stand shoulder to shoulder with you as you raise your family. As we move forward this year, we need to hear your voices. What are you and your children experiencing? How can we help you? This month "It Takes a Village" will focus on your experiences as a family. What do you want our children and youth to experience this year in their religious education? Please join us **on Sunday, August 14, at 9:00 am,** to discuss these important questions.

I attended the annual Unitarian Universalist Musicians Network (UUMN) Conference, which took place July 20-24, 2016, and was joined by over 200 UU musicians from across the U.S. and Canada. This year it was hosted by the wonderful folks of First Unitarian Society of Madison, Wisconsin. The conference music/worship focus theme was "Intentionally Engaged in Radical Collaboration."

In residence during the conference were three incredible visiting artists. Worship Artist and Consultant Marcia McFee gave two extended plenary sessions on strategies for enlivening and providing transformational worship services in our UU churches. Marcia was the visionary designer of our worship experiences that combined all

the musical and visual arts, and she powerfully led and participated in each service during the four days of the conference.

Eminent choral conductor and Tai Chi master Adam Con directed our conference choir, and he incorporated Tai Chi movements along with effective singing techniques as we rehearsed and performed several inspiring choral pieces. Emily Ellsworth, extraordinary conductor of ANIMA, the Young Singers of Chicago, directed the UU National Children's Choir during worship services and for an inspirational evening concert.

All three artists joined forces for the two Sunday services in the design and execution of an astounding transformational collaborative worship experience. Space here does not permit a full description of all the experiences and resources provided by the conference to empower and inspire UU musicians to serve their respective church communities. Garden and Grounds



About one third down / two thirds to go - summer that is. Last year we had almost 30 inches of rain through June, this year 14.6 - much closer to average. Things look good, but we still need continued TLC for the planted beds and pots. So kudos and mucho gracias to the faithful watering crews. I am always amazed at how things in the woods and along the trails on our rocky hilltop survive heat and wind, and drought this time of year. The surprise lilies that survive on our tough hill have popped open in unexpected places, lending their fragile beauty for a few brief days.

It is summer "daisy" time. Blackeyed susans (rudbeckia), coneflowers (Echinacea) and "daisies" of various sorts thrive on our hill. Asteraceae is a huge

family of 1620 genera including, daisies, asters, chrysanthemums, marigolds and zinnias. Paleobotanists suggest that the first members of this (daisy) family may have evolved some 50 million years ago, based on the discovery of well-preserved fossils that date to the Eocene Epoch_(56 million to 33.9 million years ago). Daisies are my favorite flowers and it is fun to know they are (possibly) the first flower type to develop. For tens of millions of years plants and trees had no flowers.

Some unknown "varmint" ate two plantings of sunflower seeds in the kids' garden. Had just sprouted a few leaves and were eaten to the ground. The bronze fennel that has done so well by the back patio and hosted black swallowtails, for some reason did not survive in the same location this year. There are fewer butterflies of all sorts around this year and I have seen no monarchs on the hill or in my yard so far. Please let me know if any of you spot them.

I often see some larger hawks in the woods but there is also a smaller one that flew down the drive. Flew along the fence about shoulder high and didn't notice me standing there so close I could see his shiny black eye. Felt like a gift and a lovely reminder of why I spend so much time alone outside.

Green Sanctuary Update



If any of you newcomers have wondered about that "ACCREDITED GREEN SANCTUARY" sign at the Sheridan entrance, the December 2011 Hope Board of Trustees approved a proposal to begin candidacy for that UUA designation. The Association provides a well-defined, rigorous set of requirements that our congregation worked on for three years and accomplished. The February 27, 2015 official notice of that award is posted on the back wall of the sanctuary.

FYI, there are just under 25% of the 1,092 UUA churches worldwide that have achieved that distinction.

Improving energy efficiency is an important goal of the GS program and this year's annual report to UUA will include data evaluating the new HVAC unit at Hope Church. Key to being able to do this was an EnergyStar evaluation program benchmark dataset developed during the Green Sanctuary candidacy application preparation.

Learning about this program was a major benefit from the February 2012 professional assessment of the building's energy usage. This program also has sections that can be used by home owners and business owners to measure energy usage improvement following building improvements.

The impressive logic in the program is that it provides a credible way to measure what has been accomplished, very difficult to do by simply analyzing utility bill charges because of the huge year-to-year variation in Oklahoma weather conditions. It does that by comparing our worship facility's energy usage performance to others in a large EnergyStar database who are of similar building/congregation size and activity level in the same geographic area.

A benchmark dataset was developed from Hope utility bills for the years 2010-14. Hope's average rating was a dismal 24.2 on a scale of 1-100.

Installation of the new HVAC system approved in the September 2014 special congregational meeting chaired by Ken Jones was completed in January 2015, and Hope's rating for FY 2015-16 has jumped to 41. Taking into account annual utility bills cost for the 5 years 2010-14 and an annual average of \$8,000 for heavy maintenance costs in FY 2013 and 2014, annual estimated cost savings is a very significant \$9,800. We can hardly wait to see a full-year 2016's rating!

Outreach News

"Gap Packs" Fundraiser

Individuals are released from **David L. Moss Detention Center** at all hours of day and night and in all types of weather and often with no resources, no transportation, no one to call or places to go. At times people re-offend just to have a safe place to go, or are themselves victimized when they are at their most vulnerable. A Gap Pack is intended to help by providing basic resources to those in need in their first 24 hours out of jail.

A **Gap Pack** is a zip lock bag containing basic essentials such as bottled water, snacks, socks, a thermal blanket, condoms, tampons, a map of downtown Tulsa, a notebook with a poem, pen and resources list.

All Souls Criminal Justice Outreach (CJO) in partner with other organizations conducted a successful Gap Pack pilot program in April, 2016 in which they provided 100 Gap Packs. They now estimate the need for 250 packs a month.

Hope's Outreach Committee is partnering with All Souls CJO in supplying items. One of the items included in the Gap Packs is a thermal blanket and the Outreach Committee's goal is to buy 250 Mylar blankets (or more). Please help us reach this goal!
