Where to Draw the Line

A church is one place we regularly practice being open and vulnerable. It is a community where we bring our "utmost concerns." Joy, sorrow, creation, death, trust, unfaithfulness, and everything in between are suitable topics.

Learning how to be emotionally available while setting healthy boundaries is a challenge. Is it OK to offer this person a hug during the coffee hour after hearing about their latest diagnosis? Can you reprimand that young member racing past and about to trip an elder? Should you share what you know about someone else? Why isn't everyone working as hard here as I am? These are all questions for discerning appropriate boundaries.

"A boundary is a limit. By the limits you set, you protect the integrity of your day, your energy and spirit, the health of your relationships, the pursuits of your heart. Each day is set by your choices." This insight comes from the book I recommend to everyone, Anne Katherine's Where To Draw the Line: How to Set Healthy Boundaries Every Day.

If you are entering 2017 with any lingering resentment, author and mental health counselor Katherine suggests sloppy or violated boundaries may be the problem. All the questions above involve boundaries. A hug? Ask before crossing into someone's physical space. Running child? Mention the church has rules about running inside or ask if his/her family has rules about running when you might hurt someone. Sharing someone else's information? Is the news truly yours to share? "The purpose of gossip is to draw the listener to your side and away from the other person."

The last situation is the work load resentment. In a church where much of what we do runs on the generosity of volunteers and their time, be clear about what you have time to do and what is too much. Hope Church has made great strides in rotating leadership and power. If you feel stuck in a volunteer position and resent it, it is time to speak up to start a healthy process for replacing yourself.

"A remarkable change can grow in your life as you practice the art of setting boundaries. Your life takes on more definition. You know who you are more clearly. Time and energy are freed for your chosen pursuits. People gain respect for you." May we all be gentle yet firm as we learn over and over again where to draw the line to have the happiest 2017 together.



Notes from the Board—December 2016

The Board meeting started with minutes and reports being approved. Financial reports and progress on the budget was reviewed. The final number for the annual auction is \$26,880. There may still be some money coming in for a few of the sign up parties. The end of year anonymous donor match is going strong and there is still time to give.

The Board and Finance Committee are jointly reading the book "Beyond Fundraising: A Complete Guide to Congregational Stewardship" by Wayne B. Clark. Once everyone has read the critical chapters, the Board and Finance Committee will have a meeting together in order to begin a conversation about fundraising at Hope.

Claudia Vandiver lead the Board in a "dreams for the church" exercise about what we as church members would like to see at the church from programs to improvements to the physical space. The Finance Committee will use this information to help set the pledge goal.

The Board reviewed the description of the Personnel Committee for the board book. Suggestions and changes were noted and will be communicated to the committee. The final description will be voted on at the January meeting.

The Board approved for the Outreach Committee to raise funds (\$450) through different avenues such as Faithify (a UUA sponsored crowd funding website), hosting a speaker or taking up a separate collection to benefit the Gap Packs program.

The Board also approved for OU-Tulsa to come to Hope to do a poverty simulation. **Anne Steiner** is working with OU to find a date-either late February or early March. There will need to be a minimum of 40 participants/ a maximum of 80. We will reach out to neighborhood churches and extend an invitation to them.

Hope Church has been registered to march in the annual Martin Luther King day parade on January 16, 2017. Details on meeting place, time, etc will be forthcoming.

The Board returned to the tabled discussion about the make up of the executive committee. The Board agreed if changes were to be made, those changes would not be effective until July 1, 2017 for the incoming Board. The Board will continue this discussion and plans to come to a vote in the January meeting.

The Board will meet again on January 24, 2017


