

REFLECTIONS FROM THE MINISTER

As I reflect on the theme of joy for April, I go back to the sermon that I preached a few weeks ago. Joy is an act of resistance. During difficult times it can be hard to access joy. The fact is joy can be difficult to access during good times, but when we express and feel joy, we live healthier and more fulfilling lives.

As Rev. Joe Cherry Said:

Joy is hard. Joy requires us to feel safe enough, to be safe enough, to open to vulnerability. To feel joy, you must be brave.

The problem is when I look into the world and read the news, vulnerability is not on the top of my list, because I am afraid that someone might use that vulnerability against me. I suppose that means that the first thing I must do is find a safe place to express my joy. It occurs to me that not everyone around me deserves my joy. When I think of the places, I have felt the most joy I remember being surrounded by people that I trusted and people that I loved, I remember being able to be, fully, who I am.

That means that if we are searching for joy in this difficult time, it might be that we must search for people that help us feel safe, and when we are with them maybe we won't have to search so hard for joy, it might just find us where we are.

What began in 2013 as Night Light Tulsa—a heartfelt effort to connect with and support those often overlooked—quickly grew into a larger mission. By 2015, City Lights became a nonprofit, committed to fostering meaningful relationships and providing essential resources to those in need. Their approach is simple yet profound: learning names, listening to stories, and walking alongside individuals to restore dignity and hope.

Through programs like Night Light Tulsa, City Lights creates spaces where people can come together to serve, offering food, hygiene supplies, and companionship in an atmosphere of respect and care. Their work extends beyond immediate relief,

advocating for long-term solutions that address homelessness and its root causes.

As a proud member of A Way Home for Tulsa, they collaborate with other organizations to create systemic change, ensuring that every person has access to safe and stable housing. Their partnerships, including with the Oklahoma Center for Nonprofits, further strengthen their capacity to make a lasting impact.

George Bernard Shaw says, "The joy in life is to be used for a purpose. I want to be used up when I die."

When I think about George Bernard Shaw's quote and my opportunity to serve as a DRE, I think about the importance of serving with intentionality and joy! Every chance I am given to serve, I do it with purpose and joy, realizing that life is a journey, and you can leave an essential footprint by serving others with purpose and joy.

Joy is essential when working with children because it creates an environment where they feel safe, valued, and free to explore. Joy fuels the children's curiosity, strengthens their sense of belonging, and fosters resilience. When adults bring joy into their interactions with children, they model a way of engaging with the world that is open, hopeful, and filled with possibility.

The goal of the CYRE department is to create strong, trusting relationships between the children, their families, and the serving adults. As adults, we understand that when children experience warmth and playfulness, they are more likely to feel secure and confident. Since joyful learning is essential, we encourage the children to build community with one another as they engage in play, laughter, and discovery. As adults serving in the RE department, we aim to foster emotional growth and opportunities for children to experience joy. These experiences teach the children that emotions are dynamic and that even in difficult moments, happiness can return. Joy builds resilience and emotional intelligence. It also brings people together and creates meaningful connections. In a joyful environment, children learn cooperation, empathy, and the power of shared experiences.

When we embrace joy as a practice rather than a pursuit, we find it woven into the fabric of our daily lives, waiting to be noticed and cherished. When we share joy with children, we create a foundation for a more compassionate, hopeful future.

I challenge you to find things that bring you joy, help you show compassion, and create a hopeful future in our community.

This Month's Cereal Sunday will be on April 13th.




